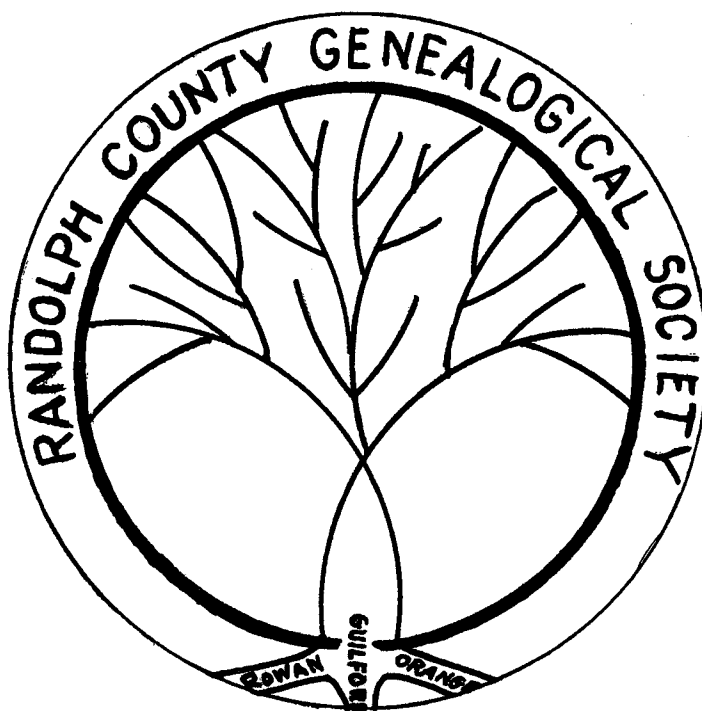

## GATLIN CEMETERY SURVEY

Ernest GATLIN an active member of our Society, who lives near Erect in the southeastern section of Randolph County, did a survey of family cemeteries in his section of the county. One of these cemeteries is still being taken care of by family members, others are now abandoned and overgrown.

His listing is printed here in the hope that they will help some of you, and in return there is a chance that maybe some of you will be able to add known burials. (ENG)

- (1) Start at crossroads of 1002 and 2873 go west on 1002 1.1 mile turn left on 2872 go .3 mile, turn left on (formerly old Courthouse road) go .2 mile to fork, go right fork .3 miles to MANESS graveyard on the left.  
1st. row: Ora Jane OWENS Jan. 14, 1918 - Sept. 14, 1918  
2nd. row: Lydia A. wife of James S. MANESS Mar. 27, 1862 - July 7, 1908  
Cleavland MANESS July 11, 1855 - Feb. 19, 1907  
Howard GARNER infant of M. B. & Hassie GARNER Feb. 26, 1920  
34d. row: Eli MANESS Mar. 8, 1850 - Jan. 9, 1900  
Johnie MANESS June 24, 1897 - May 11, 1899  
Emilia MANESS Mar. 18, 1890 - Nov. 21, 1892  
Catherine MANESS Nov. 20, 1884 - Sept. 16, 1903  
rows 4 & 5: 11 graves marked with field stone, unlettered.  
6th row: Elmer Odis MANESS Dec. 24, 1912 - Jan. 20, 1913 son of Paul & Mishie MANESS

Mr. Johnie MANNES is also buried here, (confirmed by the family) & the first of this family to Randolph.

This cemetery is well kept by the family.

- (2) Start at crossroads of 1002 & 2873, go west on 1002 1.1 mile, turn left on 2872, go .3 mile turn left on (formerly old Courthouse road) go .2 mile to fork, go right fork south 1 mile going by MANESS cemetery. This graveyard is in a hedge between a field and bottom beside the old road. There are 20 Or 30 graves marked with field stones, none are lettered. Unknown.

- (3) Start at Riverside Church, go northeast on road 2874 for 1.3 miles turn right on private road go .6 mile going around Mr. Willie HUSSY'S house to river bottom, park and go north to other side of field up into

woods about 75 yards. There are 20 or 30 graves with stone markers, none lettered. This graveyard is about 100 yards south of the old Waddell Ferry road. Unknown.

(4) Start at Riverside Church, go southwest on private road ( old Court-house road) .2 mile go west 100 yards to edge of pasture in woods, 5 or 6 graves marked with field stone, none lettered. (People in area say Russell SUGGS and his mother are buried here). SUGGS graveyard.

(5) Start at Riverside Church, go southwest on private road (old Court-house road) .6 mile leaving old road on private road to a house. This graveyard is in field behind barn about halfway back in the edge of field. There are 5 or 6 graves here, unmarked at present. There were others that were destroyed before present owner got property. (This was NOT of present owners doing.)

(6) Start at Riverside Church go northeast on road 2874 for .7 mile, this graveyard is on left in a hedge at the edge of field. There are 50 or 55 graves marked with field stones, none lettered. Two were moved to Pleasant Hill Church, they were LOWDERMILKS.

(7) Start at Mount Zion Church, go southeast between church and grave yard on old road (old Waddell Ferry road) 1.1 mile going by old house toward river. This graveyard is on left side of road. This has already been read. Check Waddell article in previous Journal. WADDELL cemetery.

(8) Start at Mount Zion Church, go north on road 2877 .5 mile to shed on left. Park and go west for .2 mile to other side of pasture into woods 25 yards to old graveyard beside of (old Flat Creek road) there are 20 or 30 graves with stones unlettered. One lettered Sally CRAVEN born Oct. 2, 1791 died July 27, 1853. This must be a CRAVEN cemetery.

(9) Start at Mount Zion Church, go north on road 2877 for .6 mile, turn right on road 2880, go .3 mile. This graveyard is on left of road about 5 yards, it is grown up with thorn bushes too bad to get in. There are 8 or 10 graves here, unable to tell whether marked or not. (This is thought to have been the WILSON graveyard.)

(10) Start at crossroads of 1002 and 2873, go north on 2873 3.3 miles, crossing a little bridge to top of hill. Turn right go .6 mile toward river (old Logan Ford road.) This graveyard is in woods at the edge of

a field, there are 10 graves marked with stones, none lettered.  
(Unknown)

(11) Start at Chatham and Randolph county lines, on road 1002, go west .4 mile turn left on road 2877 go .1 mile, this graveyard is on left of road and the highway department almost got this one. There are 10 or 12 graves marked with field stone, none lettered. (Unknown cemetery, but people of the neighborhood say that Captain John PHILLIPS is buried here.)

(12) Start at Chatham and Randolph county lines on road 1002, go east .2 mile, park and walk south to wooded area .1 mile. It looks as though there were 25 or 30 graves unmarked here. There are 3 marked graves here, one is about 15 yards from the other. One is a double rock, Rev. E. W. KIDD Jan. 10, 1843 died June 21, 1918. Francis G. wife of E. W. KIDD May 1, 1845 - no death date. James KIDD July 18, 1798 died Aug. 3, 1822 age 24 years. (This cemetery is in Chatham County.)

(13) Start at crossroads of 2873 and 1002, go east on 1002 for 2 miles, turn left on road 2876 go .2 mile, turn left on 2886 go .5 mile crossing creek at the ford to top of hill, turn left on private road go .4 mile to house park walk south in old road .4 mile to lower edge of field. This graveyard is at the edge of field about 25 yards in the woods, there are 50 or 60. The only marked stones are: William A. CARR born May 20, 1763 died April 6, 1838; Susannah wife of William A. CARR born May 8, 1767 died May 23, 1859; Lidd JONES aged 78 years died Oct. 7, 1837. CARR cemetery.

(14) Start at intersection of 42 and 1151 go south on 1151 .3 mile after crossing creek, this graveyard is on a hill in the field. There are a few grave here, all unmarked. (The exact location of the cemetery is unknown, after being destroyed by farm operation.) Unknown. Chatham county.

(15) Start at intersection of 2308 and 1151, go south on 1151 for .3 mile to house after crossing creek, park and walk .4 mile to other side of field to a wooded area above creek. There are 35 or 40 graves marked with field stone, none marked. Thomas DEATON'S two infant children and Sally the wife of George DEATON are known burials, confirmed by family members. DEATON cemetery, Chatham county.

(16) Start at intersection 2308 and 1151, go north on 1151 .2 mile up

- (17) Start above Beulah church, go east on dirt road .8 mile to road 1151, go north on 1151 for .6 mile then go left into field .3 mile to wooded area. 10 or 12 graves marked with field stones, unlettered. Unknown, Chatham County.
- (18) Start at Chatham and Moore county lines, go north of road 1151 for .7 mile park and go left .2 mile across pasture to wooded area. There are 25 or 30 graves marked with field stones unlettered. Those lettered are: George PURVIS born April 20, 1844 died Feb. 13, 1876; A. J. PURVIS born Mar. 27, 1833 died Oct. 30, 1870; Sopha wife of R. G. STOKES born Nov. 26, 1841 died June 13, 1883. PURVIS cemetery, Chatham county.
- (19) Start at Moore and Chatham county lines on road 1466 go south on road 1466 for .3 miles, park and go right 50 yards to a wooded area. 20 or 25 graves marked with field stones unlettered. 2 lettered, they are: E. S. POWERS born Feb. 17, 1820 died June 14, 1897; Agnes wife of E. S. POWERS Feb. 28, 1809 died Sept. 4, 1878. There is a tomb or something built of stones about the middle of this graveyard. (The Moore County Cemeteries by Anthony E. PARKER gives the following listing for this cemetery.) Enoch S. POWERS (Feb. 17, 1820-June 14, 1897) Agnes, wife of E. S. POWERS (Feb. 28, 1809-Sept. 4, 1878) Moses KIDD (no dates) Walled in with field stone POWERS cemetery, Moore county.
- (20) Start at county line go east on 2873 for 1 mile, go south 75 yards across field. Lydia A., daughter of H. H. and K. E. TYSON 1865-1873; Aron TYSON Dec. 1790 - Dec. 21, 1840. Moore county.
- (21) Start at Riverside church go south on road 2873 for 1 mile crossing creek at the low water bridge. One grave with exact location unknown. Said to be a Civil War deserter.

hill, this graveyard is on right of road 25 yards. 12 or 15 graves marked with field stone, none lettered. There is a large sycamore tree in this cemetery. Unknown, Chatham county.



## BINGHAM GENEALOGY

The first recorded BINGHAM found in these studies to date was Thomas BINGHAM of Pittsylvania and Halifax counties of Virginia, and Anson County of North Carolina. We do not know his date of birth nor if his parents were also in the colonies. We know that Thomas BINGHAM'S son Christopher (Kit) BINGHAM was born in Virginia in 1765.

Thomas BINGHAM was living in Anson County August 7, 1756 for at this time he acquired a Granville Grant of 200 acres on the west side of the PeeDee River and west side of Brown Creek.

It appears that he kept his residence in Virginia while obtaining and developing more land in North and South Carolina. He received 5 Craven Land Grants in 1765, 1770, and 1771 totaling 750 acres. These grants were on Naked Creek near Bennettsville, in Marlboro County, S. C.

Perhaps it was in taking care of his business both in Virginia and South Carolina that travels led him along the Uwharrie River in Randolph County, North Carolina. He apparently liked this land and decided to make his home here. The 1790 Census of Randolph lists Thomas BINGHAM as living with his family there. The count was two males over sixteen, four males under sixteen, two females and two slaves.

We have not determined how much earlier than 1790 Thomas had acquired land in Randolph County, North Carolina; however, he did purchase more land from Aron HILL, H. E. McCULLOCH, the University of North Carolina and received a state grant, 1792, 1794, 1796 and 1800.

In 1781 and 1799 he sold his land in Virginia in both Pittsylvania and Halifax Counties. His wife, Elenor (of Randolph) relinquished her right of dower.

According to deeds it looks as if Thomas owned land bordering the Uwharrie River between Betty McGee and Silver Run Creeks. We assume that Mr. Worth GARNER now owns part of this land and is living with his family within a few yards of the old home place. Mr. GARNER'S grandmother was Caroline BINGHAM and he is a direct descendant of Thomas BINGHAM.

Thomas BINGHAM'S will dated 20th January 1816 and probated in Randolph County, North Carolina in August 1816 named his wife, Elenor, sons Michael, Elijah, Christopher and William; daughters Sarah CALLICOTTE and Milly DETHERIDGE; and grandson Thomas CALLICOTTE. He willed all of

his land to Michael, giving his widow life time rights, with all household property, stock, etc. to be divided between Michael and Elijah. Michael received two slaves, Elijah one, and his grandson Thomas one; the rest received from 20 sthulings to \$50.00 each.

We are descended from Thomas through Michael who had 5 sons: William, Nathaniel, Thomas, Greene Berry and Warren; and daughters: Caroline, Rebecca, Lovina and possibly Synthia. All of these names except Warren's appear on a deed to settle a portion of Michael's estate: William BINGHAM, et al, to N. SMITHERMAN, 24 September 1861. Caroline signed as the wife of A(a)ron LASSITER; Rebecca as the wife of Abner LEWIS; Synthia signed as Synthia RILY and Lovina as the wife of James WALLACE, L. G. B., Lorenzo GreenBerry Barnum BINGHAM signed this deed for his father Warren who died at the age of 39 in 1850.

Michael BINGHAM did not leave a will. He died in 1854 and his estate was not settled until 1871.

William BINGHAM (Uncle Billy) was administrator of Michael's estate. William was born in 1815. He first married Mary LASSITER in 1835. They had a child named Laura Ann. Mary died and William then married her sister Elizabeth.

The 1860 census for Randolph County, North Carolina gives William age 44 a miller; Elizabeth (Aunt Betty), age 38; L. Ann, age 22; Micajah, age 18; John, age 11; Jason age 8; and Dow, age 3 months.

The 1870 Census lists William as head of household, Concord Township (P. O. Hills Store), age 54, a farmer and Elizabeth, age 48, Jason Lee, age 20; and William A., age 10.

Warren BINGHAM was an older son of Michael, born 1811 and died at the age of 39 in February of 1850 of "continuing fever, sick 10 days". His widow, Rebecca LAUGHLIN, was listed in 1850 census of Randolph County, North Carolina as head of household, age 40 (born 1810) with L. G. BINGHAM, age 14; Julian, age 5, blind; and Eliza NELSON, age 19.

Rebecca married Newton CARTER seven years later and deeded the farm of 108 acres on Jackson's Creek to L. G. B. BINGHAM, then age 21, and Julian, age 12 years.

L. G. B. or Barnum was born in 1836 and died in 1914. He was married to Emily WARD, daughter of Lewis and Elizabeth WARD.

According to the 1870 census of Randolph County, Barnum was head of household in Concord Township (P. O. Salem Church) age 34, a

carriage maker, born in N. C.; Emily, age 28; John W., age 6; Rebecca M., age 4; Florence, age 3; Warren, age 8 months; and Jacob LAUGHLIN, age 15, farm laborer.

Barnum and Emily's children were: J. Webster BINGHAM, Farmer, N.C.; Titia RIDGE of Flora, N. C.; Flora MORGAN, Farmer, N. C.; W. L. G. BINGHAM, Denton, N. C.; Idonie TALLEY, Randleman, N. C.; Nannie WILBORN, Trinity, Rt. 1,; Tom W. BINGHAM, Farmer, N. C.; Mittie MITCHELL, Lilac, N. C.; Katie LOFTIN, Flora, N. C.

Barnum with the help of his brother, sons and daughters and labor made buggies by hand for about 30 years - from 1870 to 1898, approximately 1120 buggies.

#### Additional Data

At least 30 deeds in land transactions from 1792 to 1850 are in Randolph County Courthouse.

Kit or Christopher BINGHAM, born 1765, lived on Birkheads Mountain, was father of Ragsdale BINGHAM and died in his home at over 100 years of age. (Note: he died in 1861 so did not live to be 100 years old. His age in 1850 is shown as 85 years old suggesting he was born in 1775 instead of 1765. Dorothy, his wife, gives her age as 79 and Ragsdale, their son, gives his age as 35, suggesting he was born when his mother was 44 years old. Michael BINGHAM, Christopher's brother, gives his age in 1850 as 63 years old, suggesting he was born about 1787.)

Michael BINGHAM bought 12 rods of land from Micaja LASSITER bordering Uwharrie River at junction of Fayetteville and Montgomery roads.

Michael's son William married two of Micajah LASSITER'S daughters: Mary and Elizabeth, Elizabeth being the youngest daughter by his first wife, Celia SPIVEY, and Mary being the sixth child by his second wife, Mary TADLOCK.

Michael's daughter Caroline, married Micajah LASSITER'S son, Aaron. (Note: Aaron LASSITER, 1822-1897; Caroline BINGHAM LASSITER, 1829-1874.)

His daughter Rebecca married Abner LEWIS who taught school.

In 1820 Kit BINGHAM sued Noah SMITHERMAN in court and collected \$1380.00. (Note: this lawsuit was against Samuel SMITHERMAN, instead of Noah SMITHERMAN, acting as Administrator of the estate of John LATHAM. John LATHAM sold property to Christopher BINGHAM but never

gave him a deed to the property. Christopher BINGHAM sued the estate.)

Michael's daughter Lavina married James WALLACE. She was buried at Star, North Carolina. Wallace Drug Store in Star is operated by her descendant.

Michael's son, Green Berry (brother to William and Warren) married Eliza McGOOGAN, a school teacher. He was a wagoner and owned much land in Montgomery and Richmond Counties, North Carolina. He was buried at Macedonia Presbyterian Church, Candor, North Carolina. He adopted and raised his brother John's two sons; after John died during the Civil War.

Michael BINGHAM'S wife was Frances from South Carolina.

Apparently from bills of sale, grants, deeds, etc. the BINGHAMS carried on a lot of business in Montgomery and Rockingham Counties in North Carolina, and Marlboro and Chester Counties in South Carolina from 1770's to the 1860's.

\* I have learned Cynthia BINGHAM was the sister of Great Grandfather Michael BINGHAM.

(Not Correct)

I have learned that Synthia BINGHAM was the daughter of grandfather Michael. By Euna WALLACE.

(Additional Information from Randolph County Records)

Christopher BINGHAM evidently had other sons besides Ragsdale. In Will Book 12 and 13 are the following Estate records:

Alvory BINGHAM, 1862, Lewis BINGHAM Administrator.

Frances BINGHAM, 1861, John C. BINGHAM, Administrator until his death in 1864. Jonathan LASSITER became Administrator in 1864.

Christopher BINGHAM, 1863-63, Calvin SHAW, Administrator.

John C. BINGHAM, 1864, Jonathan LASSITER, Administrator.

Who for their verdict say, That they find that the paper writing offered for Probate, marked A in the following words & figures, to wit -

State of North Carolina)  
Randolph County )

I, William RIDGE, Senr., being weak in body but of sound and perfect mind and memory, but considering the uncertainty of my earthly existence, do make and declare this my last will and testament in manner and form following, that is to say, first I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Jane RIDGE all my estate both real and personal to be hers and at her disposal during her natural life.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my Grandson Ransom RIDGE one dollar.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my Grand daughter Abigail ARNOLD, one dollar.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my Grandson Branson RIDGE one dollar, besides what their father Thomas RIDGE has already received.

(Cont.)

Item. I give and bequeath unto my grand daughter Jane LASSITER one dollar.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my Grand daughter Rebecca LOWE one dollar.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my grandson Noah DUNBAR one dollar besides what their mother Sarah DUNBAR has already received.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Rebecca RUSH one negro girl by the name of Frank to be hers after the death of her mother.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Jane HICKS one negro boy by the name of Paten to be hers after the death of her mother.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my son William RIDGE fifty dollars in money, over and above what he has already received to be his after the death of his mother.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my son Meredith RIDGE the land and possessions whereon I now live and fifty dollars in money to be his after the death of his mother, and after his death to be equally divided between his four sons, Thomas, Willis, William and Dougan RIDGE besides what he has already received.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary MILLER one negro girl by the name of Kitty, to be hers after the death of her mother, my desire is, that all the residue of my property not heretofore named to be equally divided between my three daughters, Rebecca RUSH, Jane HIX and Mary MILLER after their Mothers death and lastly I do hereby Constitute and appoint my sons in law Ninevey RUSH and Jesse MILLER my executors to this my last will and testament revoking and declaring void, all former wills and testaments by me made, in witness whereof I the said William RIDGE, Senr. do hereunto set my hand and seal this the 24th day of May Anno Domini 1845.

Is the last will and testament of William RIDGE, deceased, and that he did thereby devise and bequeath. Whereupon Ninevah RUSH and Jesse MILLER the Executors therein named appeared in open Court and were Qualified and obtained letters Testamentary on the said estate of William RIDGE deceased.

At the May Term, 1839 of the Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions, Sarah PAGE, the widow of Benjamin PAGE, Senior who departed this life in the month of April last intestate in Randolph County, petitioned the court asking that "a Justice of the Peace and three freeholders to allot and lay off to your petitioner so much of the crop, stock and provisions on hand as shall be sufficient for the support of your petitioner & family for one year - and in case there should not be a sufficiency of crops, stock & provisions on hand that they assess the value of the deficiency.

Your petitioner further prays your worships to require the said Justice of the peace & freeholders to assign to your petitioner one wheel, one bed & its necessary furniture & one pair of cards, if such articles are among the goods & chattels of the intestate & that they report the proceedings to the next term of this court."

At the same May Term, 1839 the following petition was filed.

Upon the Petition of Sarah PAGE it is ordered by the Court that James POLK, Esqr., Raford COLE, Danul BROWN & John LEACH be appointed a committee to lay off & allot to the said Sarah PAGE one years support for herself & family out of the crop, stock & Provisions belonging to the Estate of her late husband Benj. PAGE Deceased, & if there be not enough thereof they will assess such sum of money as may be sufficient to be paid her by the admr. of said Estate also one bed & its necessary furniture, one wheel & one pair of cards & make report of their proceedings to August Term 1839.

Book two (Continued)

Rome, Georgia, November 1, 1864-

In camp. In good health with prospect of rain. Weather bad. Drew rations for two days. Drew our back rations of salt.

November 2, 1864-

In good health. Rained all night last night and today until 12. This has been one of the days that has tried the soul of men. We struck tents and started for Kingston at 5 A.M. The mud was shoe mouth deep to half knee deep. We marched 15 miles and camped West of the town of Kingston, Georgia.

November 3, 1864-

Still in camp yet. Weather very chilly and drizzling rain. I went across the mountain a foraging. I got a watermelon and two chickens. I went about 5 miles. It was poor country for forage.

November 4, 1864-

In good health. Weather cold and damp. Waiting for our pay. I bought 8 plugs of tobacco. Sold them for \$10.25. We got our pay today. For me receiving \$64.00.

November 5, 1864-

In camp. In good health except for pain in my back.

November 6, 1864-

Not very well. Sick last night. I bought a revolver today. Paid \$20.00 for it. Cloudy, rainy today.

November 7, 1864-

In camp. In moderate health. Raining today. Made \$100.00 in trading today. I sold my revolver this evening for \$25.00. Made \$5.00 on it. Bought 4 plugs of tobacco for \$5.00 and sold for \$6.00.

November 8, 1864-

In good health. Raining today. The president election went off today. I was picked for one of the judges of election of Co. J. Wm. D. HALL and S. K. ROLLENS the other. The regiment polled 248 for LINCOLN and for McCLELLAND.

November 9, 1864-

In good health. Weather cloudy. Our Brigade polled 4625 for LINCOLN and 906 for McCLELLAND. Bought me a revolver today. Paid \$15.00 for it and made \$1.00 on tobacco,

November 10, 1864-

In good health. Weather nice today.

November 11, 1864-

In camp. In good health. Weather nice, cold nights, heavy frost. I sold my revolver for \$20.00 for which I had paid \$15.00.



November 12, 1864-

In good health. Weather nice. Under marching orders. Struck tents at 5 A.M. Struck up our line of march at 6 o'clock A.M. for Atlanta, Georgia. We passed over the road the third time from Kingston. Passed Cass Station. We burned Kingston and the hospitals. Came through Cartersville and crossed the Etowah River, marched to the Allatoona Iron works and camped. We traveled 19 miles.

November 13, 1864-

In good health. Breakfast over. The pack up horn has blown. We took up our line of march, passed Allatoona. Traveled about 5 miles and tore up the railroad and passed through Acworth and came to Big Shanty and camped. Traveled 16 miles.

November 14, 1864-

In good health. Weather nice. Struck tents at 5 A.M. Passed Allatoona at 7 o'clock. Came to Marietta and found it in a flame of fire. Traveled 26 miles. We crossed the Chattooga River and camped.

November 15, 1864-

Struck tents and marched into the city of Atlanta. Found it in a flame of fire and bags of powder bursting and shells exploding. I made \$6.75 trading in tobacco. Weather nice. In good health.

November 16, 1864-

In good health. Struck tents and marched for Savannah. Passed through Decatur at 10 A.M. Bad orders in regard to foraging. Marched 15 miles, camped. We passed over some very nice country. In good health. Weather nice.

November 17, 1864-

In good health. Was detailed to forage. I foraged one hog, two peefowls, canteen of molasses, one bushel of meal, one cow, a mess of potatoes. Stopped at Constation (sic) for dinner. We burned two locomotives and tore up about 4 miles of the road and burned it. We passed over some nice country. Very sandy. Sand cheap. I sold my overcoat for \$3.00 that I paid \$2.00 for. Very tired. Traveled 15 miles.

November 18, 1864-

In good health. Weather fair. Breakfast. Pack up call has blown. Took up our line of march at 8 A.M. Crossed Yellow River. Stopped for dinner. Then tore up a lot of the railroad. Passed through Covington. I foraged a hog in town. It would weigh 300 pounds neat. Traveled 15 miles. Camped. We passed over some level country and good land.

November 19, 1864-

In good health. Raining this morning. Crossed the Costansula River. Passed Santown (sic). Marched over some good country. Traveled 15 miles.

November 20, 1864-

Raining. Very muddy. In good health except a pain in my back. Traveled 18 miles.

November 21, 1864-

Raining. Very muddy. Traveled 11 miles.

November 22, 1864-

Very cold last night. Snowed a little this morning. Crossed Cedar Creek.

November 22, 1864 (Continued)

I shot two cows in the creek that had give out. Foraged some flour and a hog. We camped on General Howell COBB's farm. Our regiment was on picket.

November 23, 1864-

In moderate health. Very cold this morning, Struck tents and struck up our line of march. Stopped in a mile of the Capitol and got dinner. Weather nice. My back is hurting me very bad. Am running off at the bowels. Dinner over and we marched to the edge of the city and camped for the night. I went a foraging. I killed 4 turkeys at two shots, two guineas at one shot. Got a hen, some flour and meal and sweet potatoes. Returned to camp in good order. Got supper. Went to the city. Got some lasts and pegs and half soled my shoes.

November 24, 1864-

In camp. In good health. Weather nice. I went to the city of \*Milleggeville, Georgia. I went to the State House and from the bank I got 10¢ in silver and about one million of Confederate script on the Oxford Bank. It hadn't been signed yet so I sold it to the boys for \$7.50 except two hundred and twenty I kept for myself. Cleaned my gun for inspection.

November 25, 1864-

I stood picket last night. Struck tents and marched through the city of Milleggeville. Crossed the Oconee River. Then crossed Twin Creek. Traveled over some levees and piney swampy country. Traveled 15 miles. Camped.

November 26, 1864-

In moderate health. The weather fair. Passed through a swampy country. Crossed Black Swamp River and up Alder Creek. Traveled 12 miles. Passed through Sandersville after dark and camped.

November 27, 1864-

In good health. Struck tents and started on our line of march at daylight.

November 27, 1864-

In good health. Struck tents and started on our line of march at daylight. Crossed the Ogeechee River and traveled through good level country. Traveled 18 miles. I let Captain CAVE have \$110.00 to keep for me until we get through.

November 28, 1864-

In good health. Struck tents and started on our line of march. Traveled 5 miles. Came to the East prong of the Ogeechee River and found a bridge on fire. The rebs had fired it and left at daylight. We soon fixed the bridge so the infantry passed over. The first brigade marched into the town of Louisville. The boys made quite a raze. We marched 2 miles past town, camped. Traveled 8 miles.

November 29, 1864-

In good health. The weather has been very warm for 3 days. Struck tents at daylight. Started at 7. Marched 2 miles. Came to the creek and bridge burned.

\*Milleggeville was the capital of Georgia at this time. It was a beautiful city of well kept residential areas. A court house occupied a spacious square in the heart of the city. According to history, the residential area was untouched; however, the library and archives were ransacked and the penitentiary destroyed.

November 29, 1864- (Continued)

We soon passed over. Marched about a mile and formed a line of battle behind a barricade. Our calvary has been skirmishing with the rebs for 5 days. They whipped them yesterday. General KILPATRICK is here with 700 of his calvary.

November 30, 1864-

In good health. Laying still today. Washing up our clothes. The weather is as hot as a summer day. We buried an orderly sergeant out of the 10th Wisconsin Battery. Died of typhoid fever on the 29th of November, 1864.

December 1, 1864-

Today finds me in good health. The weather is nice. There are 17 of Co. I. relieved from duty this morning and marked on the retired list. We struck tents and started on our march at 10 o'clock. Marched about 3 miles and afoul of the rebs. Our calvary had a heavy skirmish with them. We lost 3 men killed, 8 wounded. They took some prisoners and killed one of them. We marched 8 miles and camped for the night. Weather very hot.

December 2, 1864-

In good health. A heavy fog this morning. Struck tents at daylight and marched out 4 miles and run into the rebs again and had a heavy skirmish with them and drove them back at Buckhead Creek without any loss. One wounded. Weather very hot. We passed through a level and sandy and swampy country. Burned several cotton gin houses. We marched 10 miles. Camped.

December 3, 1864-

In good health. Weather nice. Traveled 15 miles in the round. The rebs captured 4 of our boys. One got away from them and one of Co. F. was captured. E. J. EVERT is his name. We came to Thomas Station and had a heavy skirmish with the rebs and drove them back and captured one rebel captain that was wounded. Went in camp and tore up the railroad. I was on picket. The calvary skirmishing at 11 o'clock P.M. The rebs threw 6 shells killed two of our men, wounded one with a revolver ball.

December 4, 1864-

Today finds me on picket. In good health. It rained a little last night. Heavy cannonading this morning. The rebs are falling back but the shelling is heavy as they retreat. Weather nice and warm this morning. We had a heavy fight with the rebs this forenoon. Our calvary charged them for three miles killing and wounding 80 of them and capturing 100 prisoners, 2 pieces of artillery. Drove them 5 miles from Waynesboro. We then fell back through town and start for Savannah. Traveled 21 miles in the rounds and camped. Very tired from the day's hardships.

December 5, 1864-

In good health. Very sore from marching. Struck tents and started at daylight. Passed through a level sandy country and long leaf pine timber. Traveled 20 miles and camped on Beaverday Creek. Very warm. We captured 19 horses from the rebs and one dispatch cart.

December 6, 1864-

In good health. Weather hot. Passed through a sandy swampy country. Traveled 15 miles.

December 7, 1864-

In good health. Rained a little last night and cloudy, very warm this morning. Rained all day. Our calvary had a fight with the rebs. Lost 2 killed, one captain, one orderly. Lost several taken prisoner. Traveled 15 miles. Camped and threw up breastworks and lay there until midnight. Then pulled out traveled 7 miles and stopped for breakfast.

December 8, 1864-

In good health. The weather a little cooler. Struck tents and started on our march. Marched to the church where General Wills HENTON (sic) had his headquarters. It was built in 1769 out of brick imported from England. I was in it. \*It is as nice a church as I ever saw. The German Bible was printed in 1802 and the English Bible in 1822. I read the First Psalm in the pulpit. I then went out to the fort green about a hunderd yards from the church. It was very worn down and corn raised in it this year. I then went down and looked at the Savannah River and looked at the old rebellious State of South Carolina. I then came back. Passed the church and went up the stairs and rung the bell. Then came down. Passed the grave yard. It is marked 21 miles from here to Savannah. We traveled from there through a barren pine swampy country. I went out a foraging and killed four shotes at one shot. Brought one in. Gave the rest away. Traveled 7 miles. I went and fried some sweet potatoes for supper and breakfast. Breakfast had no bread. We ate the shotes for supper and breakfast, four of us.

December 10, 1864-

In good health. We drew four crackers to the man. In good health. The weather cloudy. Drizzling rain. Traveled 7 miles through a swampy country.

\*A present day Georgia historical roadside sign reads as follows: "Jerusalem (Ebenezer) Church. Built in 1768-9 by Lutheran Protestants who came to Georgia in 1734 after being exiled from Catholic Salzburg in Europe. The church is officially named Jerusalem Church. It stands on the site of a wooden building probably erected soon after the congregation moved from the Old Ebnenzer to New Ebenezer in 1738. During the Revolution, the British used the church as a hospital and the metal swan on the belfry still bears a bullet hole. Though the town of Ebenezer no longer exists the Church has an active congregation of about 400 members largely from Savannah."

According to tradition no nails were used in the building. The swan of Martin LUTHER's coat of arms still graces the top of the wooden belfry. Twenty-two inch thick walls still hold the original glass windows. A clock over the door bears the date 1769.

The sanctuary of the church is the focal point of the interior. It is reached by curving stairs on both sides and enclosed within the Communion rail. The original plank benches may be found in the balcony. The bell operated by two bell ropes is said to have been a gift of WHITEFIELD, the English Divine, when he visited in Savannah with Oglethorpe. The Church is the proud possessor of a chalice. It was brought by MUHLENBERG (Lutheran Patriarch).

December 11, 1864-

In good health. Raining this Sabbath morning. I can hear the gun boats playing in Charleston. We threw up works today. We pulled up and marched 2 miles and camped. It turned very cold. Wind blew hard all night.

December 12, 1864-

In good health. Weather very chilly today.

December 13, 1864-

In good health. Struck tents and marched round the Northwest of Savannah. Camped. Traveled 8 miles. The boys hadn't had anything to eat for 24 hours. We drew rations for three days. One quarter rations for three days,

December 14, 1864-

In good health. I went a foraging and killed two calves and brought them in and sold three quarters of one of them for \$5.75.

December 15, 1864-

In camp. In good health. I went out a foraging but failed to get any forage except one hen. Weather very warm.

December 16, 1864-

In good health except a pain in my big toe. I have been rubbing it with linament for two days. The weather very warm and nice.

December 17, 1864-

In good health. Weather very hot. Some cannonading today from the gun boats.

December 18, 1864-

This Sabbath finds me in camp. In good health. The weather very hot. We had two inspections today, company and brigade inspection. I wrote a letter to Carrington BROWER today. In it I enclosed \$20.00 of the Oxford bank notes, HALL wrote to J. S. MODRESS AND J. R. HADLEY for me and him.

December 19, 1864-

In good health. Weather warm. Occasional cannonading all day.

December 20, 1864-

In good health. Went out a foraging. Killed a very fat muley cow but MARVIN killed one not so fat. We brought the hind quarters to camp and when we got to camp we found the boys that was to be mustered out there and the regiment gone to the landing so we sold and give it away except a piece. We got a bite of dinner and started after the regiment and overtook it about 7 P.M. about a quarter of a mile from the river. I let John M. BROWER have \$82.00 in money and a note of \$30.00 which makes \$112.00 of which \$12.00 was Mrs. HADLEY's and \$100.00 of my own sent to Mrs. Mary F. BROWER. I let M. A. RUPERT have my rebel knife to take home for me. I got the knife at the capitol of Georgia.

December 21, 1864-

In camp. My right knee pained me very bad all night and is not much better today. The wind is very high today. The tide is rising from the Atlantic Ocean. It rises in the day and falls at night. Weather is turning colder. Rained this morning. We're doing guard duty over the rations and on loading boats. The 17th Corps captured a fort with 7 guns and all of the ammunition. The report is that the 20th Corps went into the city of Savannah this morning.

December 22, 1864-

In camp. In good health. The wind very chilly.

December 23, 1864-

In good health. Weather moderated some. I wrote a few lines to my wife today.

December 24, 1864-

In good health. The camp was roused at 3 o'clock A.M. Breakfast over and we started for Savannah at 4 o'clock. The distance was 15 miles. We marched in town 25 minutes after 9. Marched to the wharf and reported to the commissary department for duty. John BROWER came down to see us and took dinner with us. There was a rebel colonel and a captain with five negroes and a white woman came over the river under a flag of truce to get two of their sisters out of this city. They were sent back without them.

December 25, 1864- Sunday, Christmas Day

In good health. Sprinkled rain this morning, a damp cloudy day. I bought two dozen jonney crackers for 50¢. We had a very poor Christmas. I and HALL took a walk through the city.

December 26, 1864-

In good health. We had a hard rain last night and cloudy today. There was a ship came up last evening for the first since 1864 May. The business is flush today. Apples sells for six and eight to the dollar, pickle pig feet 50¢ apiece, sweet crackers 50¢ a dozen.

December 27, 1864-

In good health. I went aboard the boat today and went down to the fleet after rations. We passed Fort Jackson and one other monitor and several gunboats. The harbor had about 20 ships in it laying at bay loaded with supplies. We landed at the fleet at sunset. Then I tasted salt water from the ocean for the first time. We went to work loading and finished loading at midnight.

December 28, 1864-

At daylight we started for Savannah and landed there at 9 A.M. this morning. Found the company gone to the Atlantic Depot. They was ordered back to the regiment to turn over their tents, knapsacks, haversacks, canteens. Then returned to the depot again.

December 29, 1864-

In good health. On guard at the landing a guarding a boat and lumber.

December 30, 1864-

In good health. Relieved from duty 9 A.M. Weather nice. John M. BROWER and a number of the others of the regiment was mustered out on the 29th of December 1864. Got transportation for 15 days, bound for Old Harrison County, Missouri.

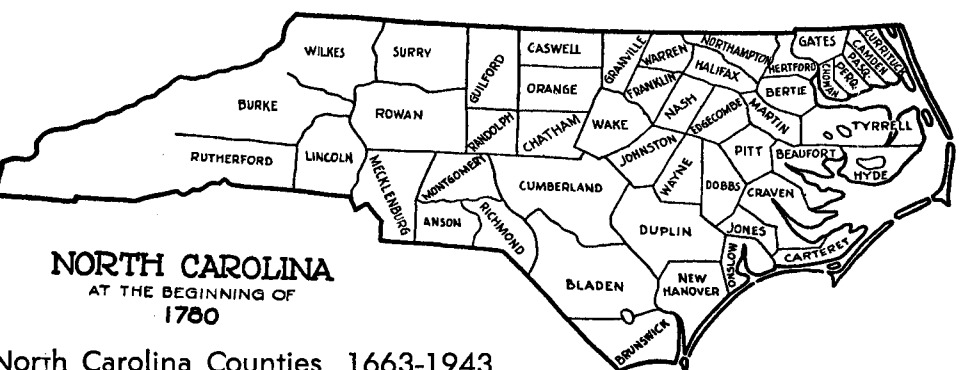
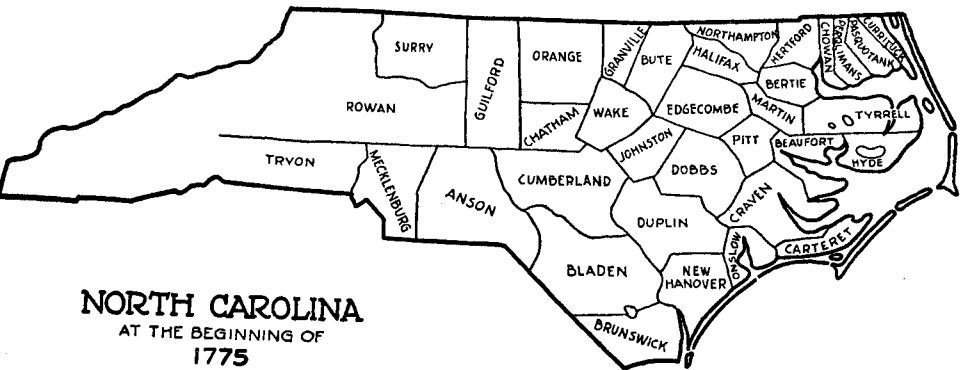
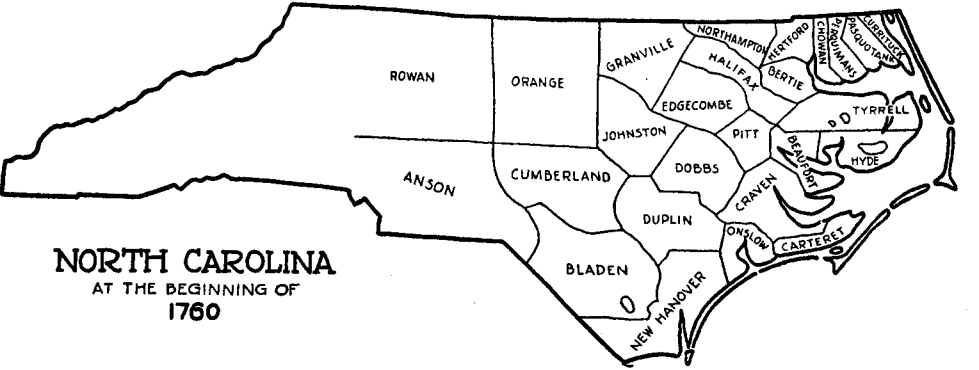
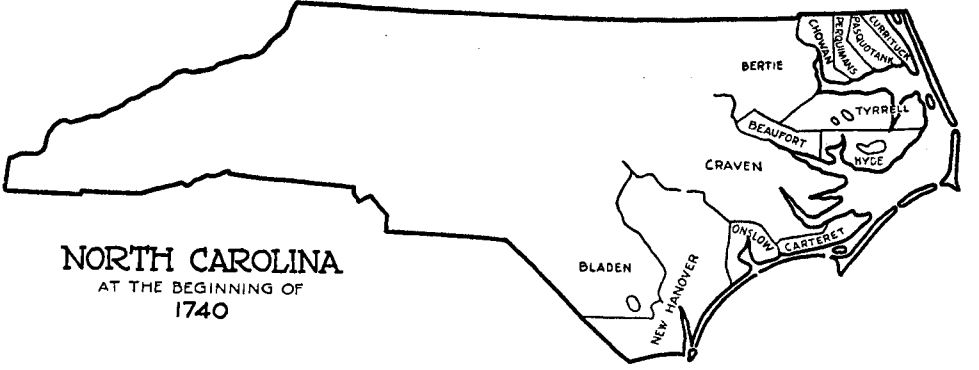
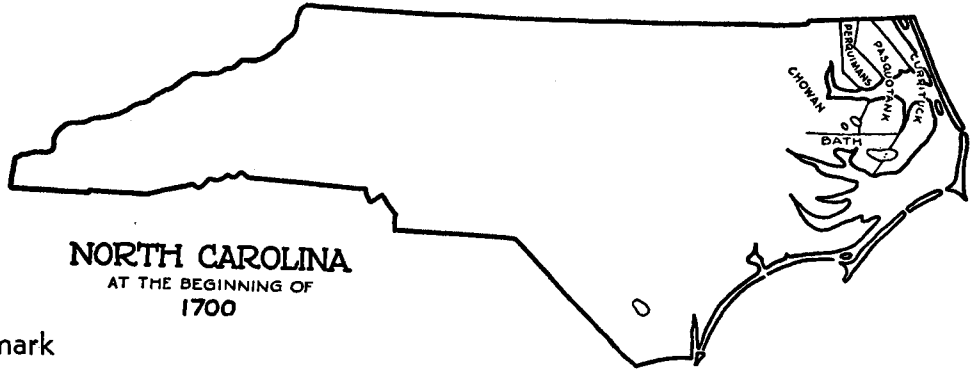
